Wiltshire Outing to Lacock (6) and Langley Burrell (6)

Most everyone will doubtless have heard of the expression "taking a step back in time", and if one was searching for a location that epitomises



this then **Lacock** would be jostling for pole position, awash as it is with thatched and stone cottages that transport you back as far as Tudor times. This is the home of film and television period drama on location. With the likes of Cranford, Pride & Prejudice, Emma, The Other Boleyn Girl, Moll Flanders, The Mayor of Casterbridge, and the ubiquitous Harry Potter franchise all filmed here,

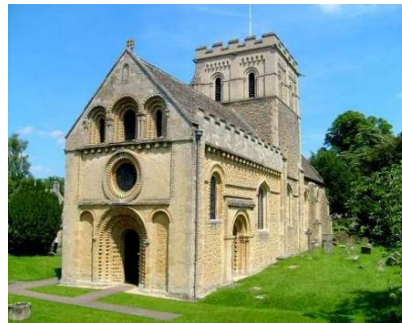
one could easily feel improperly dressed for the occasion. Lacock has been in the possession of the National Trust since 1944, with the Abbey here originally founded in 1229 by Ela, Countess of Salisbury. A good photograph to record the visit here is essential as this is the spiritual home of British photography, **William Fox-Talbot**, one of the pioneers of the photographic process, having lived in Lacock. The museum here bears his name, with the Abbey adjacent also having been remodelled by him. The bells of the magnificent 15th century church are in keeping with the perfection of the village. Moving on to **Langley Burrell** was switching from novelists to essayists, with the great diarist **Francis Kilvert** having been Rector of St. Peter's church. It would have been a small Wiltshire village surrounded by woods such as this that inspired the fictional village of Puddleby-on-the-Marsh in Hugh Lofting's Doctor Doolittle stories, although the film was shot in nearby Castle Combe. His memorable animal creation, the 'pushmi-pullyu', essentially the front half of two 'camelids' stuck together, could essentially encapsulate the yin and yang of bellringing. As the song goes in the movie "I've Never Seen Anything Like It In My Life", you may have seen something like these two locations and sets of bells, but you are unlikely to have experienced anything to exceed them. Practice at Freeland (6)
