Practice at North Leigh (6) – Saturday 8th June

If the historiette of last weekend's locations could be said to have primarily aggregated toward the 17th century then to provenance **North Leigh** one has to leaf back many pages in the book of history with there having been a large Roman villa at East End that was once a fine country residence with its own heating system and mosaic floor. Many centuries later several Oxford colleges used the quality building stone that was quarried here, especially Oriel College. The Saxon tower is one of the oldest surviving towers in the county. Our last outing here was in 1998, but I'm sure that it won't be anywhere near as long before we may reconvene here as everyone soon felt at home on the bells and a raft of method requests were fulfilled. **Hugh Deam**.

Mini Outing to Yarnton (6) and Bletchington (6) – Saturday 1st June

Scholars of the English Civil War will be aware of the connection between the two towers being more than the fact that both churches



adjoin manor houses. Yarnton Manor (now the Oxford Centre for Jewish and Hebrew Studies) was utilised as a Royalist military hospital and Bletchington Park (Bletchington Hall as it was then) as a Royalist garrison that witnessed one of the many iniquities of those divided and perfervid years. The governor Col. Francis Windebanke surrendered the house to superior Parliamentary forces, fresh from their victory at Islip, at the first summons to avoid further unnecessary bloodshed, but was soon after court-martialled and shot by his own side. In a year where the first day of June appeared to have coincided with the commencement of summer we had the chance to stand in the churchyard at Yarnton and take in a shoal of melodious birdsong that surely contrasted with the malodorous events of some 450 years ago. Anyone who has encountered the bells of Yarnton will happily acknowledge that these are bells of substance, both in terms of their weight and consonance. By way of a parallel with haute couture as an instance then the bells here would be firmly in the plus size category on the catwalk as opposed to

heroin-chic. Visits such as this are invariably enhanced by the camaraderie formed by meeting fellow travellers in bell-ringing and this afternoon was a shining example with friendly and enthusiastic ringers from both **Yarnton** and **Bletchington** augmenting our group. **Hugh Deam**.
