The Wheel of Light

Most of you will know that in July 2015 works commenced to renovate and turn



Marston's bells, and that is when I became the proud owner of the redundant treble wheel. Soon after my acquisition of this beautiful piece of history, the Beales (Wovercote ringers) came over for dinner and discussion of its fate ensued. Whilst it was thought that it would make a lovely garden feature, there was concern that, even with several coats of yacht varnish and regular maintenance, the beautiful oak and elm

timber would eventually be ruined by the damp Oxford winters. Various ideas of how to make

this rather large wheel fit in our small house without being too imposing were suggested until eventually the concept of a ceiling light fixture was born. A couple of weeks later, on a hot summer's day myself, Richard and godson Christopher started sanding down the bell wheel. However, despite gallant efforts the job was nowhere near completion. Hence, the wheel spent the winter in the shed but the vision remained. Richard and I



decided to get married in May 2016, preventing further work on the wheel that spring. Nevertheless, the Beales came up with another gem! Offering to finish the bell wheel for us as a wedding present, an offer we couldn't refuse. In August of this year the wheel saw light again and made its way to the Beale's where it was sanded, cleaned with meths and given several coats of Danish oil to bring out the grain of the timber. Finally, came the exciting part of installing colour changing LED strip lights where the rope used to be and brass chains were added to hang it from the ceiling. This strikingly transformed wheel now has pride of place in the middle of our lounge

ceiling, imposing enough to be noticed but not so intruding that it looks out of place. The result is captivating. In daylight the handsomely refurbished wood provides a magnificently historic feature to the room. At night, when lit, the assorted colour changing, or just white light settings create a very mellow ambience. Photos don't do it justice but we hope you get the idea.

Witney & Woodstock Practice at Stanton Harcourt (6) – Saturday 24th September

For those on their first visit to Stanton Harcourt church there are several unusual and probably unexpected aspects to celebrate upon before you

get down to the business of ringing. The presence of two broad towers (one for the church and one for the adjoining manor house) so close together is the first surprise, leading one to think that a mistake may have been made in the documentation of there merely being six bells up aloft. Despite the decidedly rural location the mind errs that perhaps a printing error had been made with the 'teen' missed off the end of six as this is in the proportions to be found in a metropolis. The substantial size of the ringing chamber is perhaps not a surprise given the outside girth, but the distance



between ropes is something rarely to be witnessed and can take some settling into, another strand which makes this a set of bells worth appreciating. To make matters even better it was good to see the practice supported by some new local ringers. *Hugh Deam*
